# Sylvain Ayité

**Edinburgh** 

Sylvain is a versatile professional with many passions, working as a community development worker, psychotherapist, and singer-songwriter. His approach is rooted in authenticity, a profound reverence for human bonds, nurturing positivity, and a deep understanding of human struggles and resilience. He holds a postgraduate diploma in counselling and psychotherapy from the University of Abertay, Dundee, and a diploma in Radio Broadcasting from Edinburgh College.

He is a dedicated foot soldier, constantly seeking opportunities to harness artistic expression as a catalyst for positive change within communities, collaborating with third sector agencies and mainstream health services. Sylvain was instrumental in founding Men in Mind, one of Scotland's earliest men's mental health services. His efforts have been pivotal in increasing awareness around mental health, combating stigma, and introducing creative approaches to tackle mental health issues. As a recovery worker for Change Grow Live, Sylvain witnesses the damage that drug addiction inflicts on his community and addresses it hands-on.

In his counselling and psychotherapeutic work, Sylvain operates from a place of genuine passion, aiming to facilitate spiritual growth alongside psychological healing. His focus is on guiding individuals towards achieving lasting, positive transformation.



# Alice Briggs

Alice Briggs is a place based facilitator, artist and curator from Mid Wales. Her creative practice draws inspiration from connection to nature working with communities, care, belonging 'perthyn' and the landscape. Her participatory practice is focused on learning and sharing through co-design and collaborative site responsive approaches to develop projects with, and for communities using creative workshops, performance walks and research into local heritage, ecologies and land use. Alice has over twenty years experience working in museums, heritage and the arts, but also as an arts and health practitioner with a particular focus on older people and dementia sufferers.

Alice creates work with different materials, often found in the landscape around her. She is drawn to study aspects of family history, using objects and costume belonging to her grandmother to create performance and to transform everyday familial items. Her role as a mother and a daughter seep into her work through fairytales, folk tales and the importance of care.

Nextdoor Nature has been an initiative from the Wildlife Trusts that has created community organiser roles across the regional Trusts in the UK. In Derbyshire, the Nextdoor Nature project has targeted the areas of Normanton, Arboretum and Normanton.

The main role for Adam has been supporting communities with their ideas for green projects, these include things like community gardens, for charities who want to improve access to green space or education for groups looking to appreciate the natural world.

Youth ownership over their community has been a key goal of the initiative with the Green Corridor project allowing young people to takeover and transform their local green spaces. Projects like the mural on Normanton Road have seen the children at the Pakistan Community Centre get the chance to co create the deigns with a local artist. Others, like Society Place, have given local school children the chance to redesign a walkway in the ir neighbourhood.

As the two-year project comes to an end, Derbyshire Wildlife Trust has been able to connect with and co create with numerous groups within Derby city and hope this work can continue with the support of the NAS network.

# Gabriella Gay

Gabriella Gay is a Trinidad born page-stage poet, artist, vintage dealer, teacher, PhD researcher and creative producer based in Staffordshire. She is regularly commissioned to perform, write, organise events and facilitate workshops for a wide range of organisations including the BBC, the NHS and The National Theatre. She is the founding member of Stoke's Roaming Poets and Kwanzaa Collective UK \* - an association of artists, activists and academics of colour.

Gabriella 's PhD 'Staffordshire's Colonial Connections: Reimaging Black voices from the archival debris' critically and creatively explores the silences, fragments and records of Black women and men who lived in Staffordshire.

Gabriella is an associate artist at B-arts, Restoke, and a trustee of the New Vic Theatre. She is the current artistic director of Six Towns Carnival. Gabriella has made numerus TV and radio appearances and her poetry features on buildings, in shows, exhibitions, advertisements and the Visit Stoke official video. Underlying all of Gabriella's written, performed, and socially engaged work, is the power of building strong connections and community.



### María González

María González is a London-based creative producer and facilitator. Originally from Spain, she made London her home seventeen years ago after studies in Art History and Art Education. Frustrated by the impenetrable institutional artworld, she decided she could most effectively make a difference from the outside. In 2010 she founded Lon-art Creative, a women-led organisation aiming to raise awareness about social issues through the arts, her first project being alternative tours at the National Gallery, focusing on the representation of women through art history.

In 2018 she and her team created Sheroes, a collaborative project bringing together UK and international artists, feminist organisations, institutions and the general public. Reflecting upon the comparative lack of female role models in society, Sheroes is a platform for the public and artists to share hidden herstories through visual art, workshops and talks. Maria co-curated six Sheroes exhibitions between 2018 and 2021. Each exhibition included a series of talks, workshops and events to attract a wide audience and explore different avenues to engage with the topic.

Maria is also a qualified teacher, delivering the primary languages curriculum to state schools.



#### Sophie Gresswell

Sophie Gresswell is a multi-disciplinary artist exploring identity and belonging, with particular interest in interconnected 'living' heritage. Sophie's interest stems from personal experiences of mixed heritage, particularly stories of her maternal grandparents from St Helena Island, and District 6, Cape Town. Through her work Sophie aims to visualise a connection between us which transcends our individual lifespan, and amplifies the way our human stories intersect through generations, cultures and history to bring us to the current moment in time, and inform the very people we are today. She is also a believer in socially engaged arts practice, and has experience in facilitating community workshops which inform immersive projects and exhibitions.



# Sharon Hockin

Sharon is a committed and conscientious visual arts facilitator. With over 25 years' experience she has delivered art workshops in schools, community centres, clubs and at fetes and festivals. Sharon creates bespoke sessions ranging from one day workshops to 10-week programmes and has used the visual arts to explore themes such as wellbeing, transition, displacement and self-confidence. She has worked with pupil premium and children in care in primary and secondary settings and has recently worked on a refugee programme and with a mental health charity.

Sharon has also worked with individuals to develop practical skills, knowledge and to experience the sheer joy of making and creating. Sharon is very passionate about the arts believing that everyone must have the chance to discover, investigate, question, create and communicate ideas and experiences through observing and interpreting the world around us and to realise personal intentions and have a voice. Her personal pedagogy has been to use the arts as a forum to empower, building self-confidence, self-worth, and a strong sense of self.

Sharon currently works with adults delivering an inclusive arts programme for a charity where she coaches individuals to develop their personal creative practice. She promotes professional development and strives for equity and inclusivity or the artists she works with and fosters outreach. She is always looking to forge links, partnerships and collaborations with the local community, businesses, galleries and museums. She co created and curated Henshaws Arts and Crafts Centre first artmaker symposium and festival in 2022 which celebrates the visual and performing arts after becoming disillusioned with the many barriers that neuro-divergent and artists with disabilities face in seeking forums and venues for their work.



# Jafar Iqbal

Originally from London, Jafar is a British Asian theatre producer and freelance creative who now lives and works in beautiful Cymru. As well as his role as Producer for the award-winning The Other Room Theatre, Jafar works extensively as a freelance producer. Amongst his freelance projects are a queer wrestling musical, a solo show about sex and shame, and a piece of new writing about the relationship between grief and nature. Before becoming a producer, he was one of Wales' most prominent theatre critics and arts activists, speaking publicly about inequalities in the arts sector. He's not always trying to destroy the system though (he says). He's already an accidental polyglot, but is now trying to learn Welsh, whilst also trying to learn how to swim. He has an unhealthy obsession with podcasts (so much so that he made one himself), and one of his simple joys is watching a movie on the big screen. After almost two decades working in the arts, Jafar is extremely excited about the possibilities that this programme will unlock, and he can't wait to get started.

His youth was dominated by creatively challenging values generated by post-war austerity whilst knuckling down to the seasonal and practical necessities of farm life.. Consequently, he is inherently hybrid and delights in being so. Having escaped to art school, he found a surprisingly exclusive approach that seeped into the whole art world., He spent most of his career fighting art school from the inside and, on so-called retirement in 2008, set about transferring his acquired knowledge, skills and experience to re-shaping what we mean by community arts.

Specialising in inclusion and access, over the years Cat's work taken her all over the UK; from teaching signed songs at the Royal Albert Hall and the arrival of the Paralympic flame in 2012, to performing and teaching in Special Schools, curating inclusive community music projects, and running the UK's first Makaton-friendly folk festival. Cat founded Live to your Living Room in 2020 as a way of connecting audiences with live music during the pandemic, and providing an income for performing artists. In 2021, Cat was awarded a British Empire Medal for Services to the Arts during the pandemic, as well as a Women in Live Music Award for Event Manager of the Year.

Lucie De Lacy is engagement and projects coordinator at the LEVEL Centre in Rowsley, Derbyshire. LEVEL is an award-winning contemporary art centre and charity that hosts a year-round programme of visual art exhibitions and digital installations, alongside artist residencies and creative workshops for disabled adults and young people. Lucie looks after workshops, projects, and outreach facilitation for LEVEL with a rounded programme of activity that supports disabled participants to explore the breadth and depth of their creativity.

In her personal time, she's a horticulturist in training, and part of the management team of RFM (Radio Free Matlock) – an independent, volunteer-led station with a studio in Vanishing Point Records in Chesterfield.

## Finn White

He/Him

Finn has worked in museums and heritage for over ten years where he has co-produced exhibitions, projects and learning programmes with underrepresented communities and young people. He advocates for change within the sector and runs programmes that put youth and community voice at the centre of decision-making.

He's currently Participation Manager at Historic England where, among other things, he oversees a programme that engages young people with their local history, develops approaches to using heritage for wellbeing purposes and promotes participatory practice across the organisation. Finn is passionate about social prescribing and exploring how arts and heritage sectors can connect with health and support services to help improve mental and physical wellbeing.

Prior to working in the arts and heritage sector, Finn spent nearly a decade working with teenage and adult migrants and refugees in colleges and schools. When visiting galleries and museums with these groups, Finn realised two things: firstly, that these spaces are often hopelessly unprepared to welcome people with social, cultural, financial and linguistic barriers to engagement, and secondly that he'd really quite like to work in the arts. These experiences have influenced everything he's done since.
