Elaine Alder

They/Them

New Bedford, MA

Elaine is a community- and self-taught textile artist, sculptor, ceramicist, printmaker, painter, and designer. They were raised in the Appalachian foothills of Georgia, where they first learned textile crafts and art from their grandmother. They have a B.A. in cultural anthropology and wrote an ethnographic thesis on Appalachian textile hand craft traditions. Over the years they held many jobs and service positions, including AmeriCorps VISTA, seasonal trail crew and wildland firefighter work with the US Forest Service, and youth outdoor education. Working closely with the environment and with youth in their community, they became increasingly concerned about pollution and the climate crisis. They started thinking more about the role their art could play in changing our discourse and culture around these issues. Since 2020, they have attended several

artist residencies and explored a range of natural and salvaged materials. In the past year, they have been using loom weaving and basketry techniques to make art from marine debris, bringing attention to the issue of plastic pollution. Right now Elaine is working on a sculpture of North Atlantic right whales made from marine rope which will be installed in the national historical park in downtown New Bedford.

About Stem the Tide

New Bedford, MA, used to be the world's largest commercial whaling port. Today, it is the highest value fishing port in the USA. The local fishing industry generates tons of plastic waste, while dense coastal populations accidentally or carelessly release a constant stream of single-use plastic into the sea.

Art can change the culture around the consumption and disposal of plastic products, including industrial fishing waste. Since September 2023, I've been organizing plastic pollution resistance through beach cleanups and makers' days. Participants make art and outfits from marine debris to display in local institutions or wear to political demonstrations.

His choreography and dancemaking - considered "a blend of risk-taking with reliability, [and] a combination of uncertainty and wisdom," - weaves together a physical vocabulary of momentum and clarity, moving imagery, and a commitment to relationship-building and community participation. He has danced in the companies of Christian von Howard, Keith Thompson, Jill Sigman, Paloma McGregor, and Dance Exchange - founded by Liz Lerman - where he became an Associate Artistic Director and the Director of Programs and Communications. With Dance Exchange, he collaborated on and performed in works ranging in topic from the human genome to prayer and protest, on the highest point of the Great Smoky Mountains during a total solar eclipse, and with

community organizers and activists after years of research and work in response to structures of racism and erasure in Dallas, Texas. His creative work has been commissioned and supported by places like Dance Place, the Kennedy Center, Herman Melville's Arrowhead, and Harvard University, and by the NEA, NEFA, the DC Commission for the Arts and Humanities, and the Arcus Foundation. Matthew has an MFA in dance from Texas Woman's University and is on faculty at Colby College.

About Of This Place

Of This Place is a community-based performance project that weaves together community-specific performances and programming to explore notions of belonging and surface stories - past and present - of the communities connected to Waterville, ME, and Colby College. We leverage the imaginative and generative capacities of dancemaking to bring our bodies into action and conversation as we reflect on the many different ways we relate to and shape this place we call home. This work began in 2018 and, over the past 6 years, has gathered momentum and cultivated relationships to launch into an iterative, multi-year community-connected project.

Sophie Davis is a Maine-based violinist, climate change artist, and the Artistic Director of Halcyon, an artist collective that strives to inspire environmental stewardship through music and the arts. Sophie received degrees in violin performance and environmental studies from Oberlin College and Conservatory where she studied with David Bowlin. Playing and sharing music are integral to Sophie's creative and professional practice and she has performed at festivals throughout the United States and in India, Jordan, Australia, and Samoa. In 2017-18, Sophie was awarded a Fulbright Grant to the South Pacific island nation of Samoa where she researched how music and the arts raise awareness of climate change. As a violinist and core member of Halcyon, Sophie frequently collaborates with other musicians, artists, activists, and scientists to create multimedia

performances that combine live music with film, story, and art. Her creative practice combines the honesty of science and statistical fact with the emotional qualities of film and music. Recent projects have led her to pursue coursework in stop-motion animation; research the internal documents of the Exxon Corporation; build a contact microphone to record the sounds of ice-out; and record humpback whale song aboard a tall ship in the Lesser Antilles.

About Reimagining Tomorrow - a Halcyon Education Initiative

Halcyon is an artist collective and string quartet that designs and presents collaborative multimedia performances that celebrate Maine's landscapes and communities. Having established partnerships with libraries, research labs, art museums, land trusts, and schools, community is at the heart of our work. This project expands on our current partnership with Medomak Valley High School (Waldoboro, ME) to create an 8-month art lab in which a cohort of 6-12 students will work closely with Halcyon to create art and ultimately a multimedia performance that imagines what resilient, transformed, and sustainable communities look like in the future.

"Let Every Pansy Bloom" is originally a slogan from the gay liberation movement of the 70's. As trans people in rural Maine we are often forced to hide ourselves, asked to blend in, out of safety. Jean Dolin is the Founder, President, and CEO of the Boston LGBTQ+ Museum of Art, History & Culture. A passionate social impact entrepreneur, Jean champions equal and equitable rights for immigrants and the LGBTQ+ community across Massachusetts. His decade-long career spans politics, nonprofit work, advocacy, community engagement, arts, and entrepreneurship. Starting with the American Red Cross in 2015 and interning for US Senator Elizabeth Warren, Jean's dedication to public service was cemented during the Clinton-Kaine presidential campaign in 2016. As a Public Health Ambassador for the Boston Alliance for Community Health and an AmeriCorps service member, he played a pivotal role in electing Randolph's first woman of color as an at-large councilor in 2017. In 2021, Jean founded the Dolin Impact Group,

focusing on community relationships and inclusivity. He also launched Portraits of Pride, a public art exhibit featuring influential LGBTQ leaders, and established the Boston LGBTQ+ Museum in 2023. As Chief Curator for the Massachusetts LGBT Chamber of Commerce, Jean bridges entrepreneurship and the arts, ensuring underrepresented voices are heard. He also serves on the Harvard University Institutional Review Board and the Board of Directors for LGBTQ+ Senior Housing in Hyde Park, continually advocating for equity and inclusion.

About Boston Queer Arts Festival

The Boston Queer Arts Festival is a new multidisciplinary three-day art festival that aims to create space, and experience for the LGBTQ community and opportunities for local artists to showcase their talents all the while elevating Boston as a diverse queer destination and creating economic opportunities for local queer art administrators and local lgbtq producers.

The Boston Queer Arts Festival has been a long time coming. In the past, the elements of the festival were independently hosted and produced as pilot projects. He has held Principal and Third Horn positions with the Nashville and Huntsville Symphonies and Grant Park Orchestra. He served as the founder, Music Director and Executive Director of the Nashville Chamber Orchestra for twenty years, and Music Director of the Nashville Ballet for six. With the Nashville Chamber Orchestra he has recorded with major labels, including Warner Brothers, Naxos, and Angel Records, which have been streamed over 10 million times, GRAMMY nominated, critically acclaimed in reviews by the New York Times and Classics Today,

and received the Parent's Choice Foundation Gold Award for excellence in children's media. In 2011, he cofounded the Community Engagement Lab with arts educator and teaching artist Eric Booth. The Community Engagement Lab serves teaching artists and PreK-12 educators with professional learning and planning retreats that develop school/community teaching artist residencies that bring people together to activate their creativity to imagine and build more just and thriving communities.

A violinist and vocalist, Anna Josephine Harris is an active soloist, teacher, chamber and orchestral musician, and has performed in venues such as Benaroya Hall, Boston Symphony Hall, and the Brevard Music Center. Born into a musical family, Anna started her musical studies at age four on the piano, and chose to play the violin at age seven. Anna graduated from Boston University with a major in Violin Performance and a minor in English. During this time, she served as an Artistin-Residence at the Boston Medical Center, where she created moments with music that contributed to the well-being of many facing extraordinary challenges in their lives. Anna found that much of her artistic work breached into the nonprofit arts sector, community development, and organizational leadership. After tenures at the Boston Public Library Fund as Development

Associate and New England Foundation for the Arts as a Contract Development Professional, Anna founded the organization Music on the Hill Roxbury. Anna currently serves as Development Manager for the Grammy Award-winning ensemble and social impact organization, Silkroad, founded by Yo-Yo Ma and led by Rhiannon Giddens. In addition, Anna teaches privately from her home studio in Roxbury and performs throughout the Greater Boston area.

About Music on the Hill Roxbury

Music on the Hill Roxbury (MOTH) provides music programming to families with children ages 0-5 in Fort Hill and the surrounding neighborhoods of Roxbury. Providing an inclusive musical experience that is free to all, including sing-a-long and use of age-appropriate instruments, MOTH works to build elements of rhythm, enhance freedom of movement, and strengthen personal identity, expression, and well-being for every child. MOTH offered its first 12-week session in spring 2023 and has since reached over 200 children. By offering free programming, MOTH aims to bridge divides for families who have traditionally been underrepresented and underserved in the Roxbury community.

About Survivor Story: An Artistic Approach to Harm Reduction Education

In rural New Hampshire and Vermont, we're merging visual storytelling with harm reduction to tackle the opioid crisis. Through interactive art exhibits at the TLC Family Resource Center in Lebanon, N.H., we bring to life the journey of a pregnant teenager from substance use to recovery, as depicted in Alastair's impactful short story. This initiative is enriched by our partnership with the HIV/HCV Resource Center, offering harm reduction strategies and Narcan training alongside the exhibits. Our approach intertwines the power of art with practical solutions, creating a holistic response to this critical challenge.

Shanta Lee is a writer across genres, a visual artist and public intellectual actively participating in the cultural discourse with work that has been widely featured. Winner of the Abel Meeropol Social Justice award, she was the creator and producer of Vermont Public's "Seeing...the Unseen and In-Between within Vermont's Landscape." Shanta Lee is a regular contributor to Ms. Magazine and Art New England. Shanta Lee is also the author of several poetry collection, GHETTOCLAUSTROPHOBIA: Dreamin of Mama While Trying to Speak Woman in Woke Tongues, winner of the 2020 Diode Editions full-length book prize and the 2021 Vermont Book Award. Within this latest illustrated poetry collection, Black Metamorphoses (Etruscan Press, 2023) illustrated by Alan Blackwell, is a work that Shanta Lee describes as a 2,000+

year-old phone line opened to Ovid as well as an interrogation of the Greek mythos while creating her own new language in this work. Her current multimedia exhibition, Dark Goddess: An Exploration of the Sacred Feminine, which features her short film, interviews, and photography, and other items has been on view at the University of Vermont's Fleming Museum of Art, the Southern Vermont Arts Center, and is currently on view at The Bennington Museum. Shanta Lee's forthcoming book, This Is How They Teach You How to Want It...The Slaughter: A Field Guide for the Hunted & the Hunter, The Dead-Alive, The Live-Dead Ones, The... (Harbor Editions, 2024) is in direct communication with the ancient mythology of the wild hunt — Wilde Jagd, Wild Hunt or Chase in German — in which supernatural/ghost riders are pursuing a target. About Foodstories -We Are What We Eat: Intersections Between Food, Memory, Identity and Our Stories

Foodstories will implement the idea that food can be a bridge into who we are individually and collectively. Elements will include a community based steering community for co-ownership and project accountability, direct community engagement through story collection that makes it accessible for community members and events, and a lasting artifact for the community that is a short film that features the intersection of food, memory, and identity. Guy was raised in an academic immigrant family devoted to crafting environments in which others are treated as respected equals worthy of full regard. For example, Guy's maternal grandparents smuggled Jews out of WWII Hungary and founded a humanist home for "at-risk" youth premised on full societal integration, defying norms of institutional dependence. Likewise, when Jerusalem dismissed elders as irrelevant, Guy's paternal grandmother formed an organization striving for Jewish and Arab elders' dignity and inclusion, led by convictions that ongoing sense of purpose is vital for wellbeing, and that societies cannot be whole without both elders and youth. Such values lead to original productions Guy writes/directs/

performs, touring nationally/internationally since 1998. These explore people's real-world stories through live riveting scores,

narration blending memoir and poetry, and theatrically projected sand animation. Guy's shows have received multiple funding awards from foundations such as the National Endowment for the Arts and The Boston Foundation on the basis of artistry, cultural preservation and the strengthening of communities through the arts. Leadership/music/social belonging research since 1996 informs residencies Guy designs/facilitates, from the Navajo Reservation to universities across the US. A citizen of Israel/UK/USA, Guy now calls Boston home.

In Our Words: Community Portrait Live Documentaries

Every community is made of people whose stories matter, but many go unheard. Sharing and listening to these stories can be transformative: They open windows into human courage, what people have learned about moving through loss, love and laughter. They offer constellations by which we navigate challenges and opportunities with greater humanity, imagination and possibility.

In Our Words (IOW) is driven by the conviction that everyone's story matters and that we vitally need to hear more of one another's stories.

First devised to strengthen one community's connections after the pandemic's ruptures, IOW is a moving multimedia performance of real-world stories, candidly told by the people who've lived them through theatrical projections, together with live original narration, score and musical segments. IOW builds stirring community portraits made with, of, and for specific communities.

Nigerian Igbo Day, organized by the Igbo Organization of New England, has been a cherished community event for the past decade, celebrating the vibrant arts and culture of the Igbo people of Nigeria. It's a longstanding commitment to showcasing the rich heritage and traditions of the Igbo community in New England. The presentations are done in partnership with over 20 community organizations from different parts of Nigeria.

It is critical we design programs and advocate for resources to sustain the talents of artists in our community in order to preserve the cultural heritage for generations to come.

There are various aspects of our cultural preservation that can be addressed but one that can be addressed immediately is the area of music. The "Oja" flute is a musical instrument that is a traditional instrument that is played to accompany traditional event. There is currently an elderly person in the community that performs this instrument. Part of the project is use existing resources to start after school programs to train our children on this tool and other musical instruments.

Veronica Perez is an artist whose work is deeply rooted in the community. Through her braiding circles workshops, they explore themes of erasure, identity, and interdependency. In 2020, they were awarded the Ellis-Beaureguard Visual Arts Fellowship, followed by the inaugural fellowship at the David C. Driskell Black Seed Studio at Indigo Arts Alliance in 2021. In 2022, they were a fellow at the Lunder Institute at Colby College, and subsequently had their first solo exhibition titled voices, whispering at the Center for Maine Contemporary Art. In 2023, Perez was awarded the St. Botolph Club Foundation Emerging Artist award and the Amelia Peabody award for sculpture excellence. In the summer of 2023, they had their second solo show at the University of Southern Maine Art Gallery in Gorham, shadow / echo / memory. Recently, the Maine Arts

Commission named her one of the Maine Artist Fellows for 2024 in fine arts. Currently, Perez works as the Administrative Assistant at the Black-led arts and residency organization Indigo Arts Alliance in Portland, Maine. They are also on the Southern Maine Workers' Center Board of Directors and the Policy Committee for the Opportunity Alliance. Veronica Perez resides in Westbrook, Maine, with their partner and child.

About braiding circles

Since 2021, braiding circles have been community workshops focused on crafting three-strand braids from artificial hair and textiles. Through this creative process, participants engage in candid conversations about identity, life experiences, and the profound notion of belonging, particularly from a Black, Brown, and Indigenous perspective. Initially aimed at producing braids for sculptures, these gatherings have evolved into safe spaces for open dialogues, doubling as an oral story archive to foster empathy. To date, I've hosted 21 workshops across Maine, with plans for more this year, including out-of-state sessions. These circles serve as vital platforms for community engagement and cultural exchange.
